

NATIONAL ANTHEM

The song, Jana-gana-mana, composed originally in Bengali by Rabindranath Tagore, was adopted in its Hindi version by the Constituent Assembly as the National Anthem of India on January 24, 1950. It was first sung on December 27, 1911 at the Calcutta session of the Indian National Congress. The complete song consists of five stanzas.

Jana-gana-mana-adhinayaka, jaya he,
Bharata-bhagya-vidhata.
Punjab-Sindh-Gujarat-Maratha,
Dravida-Utkala-Banga,
Vindhya-Himachala-Yamuna-Ganga
Uchchala-Jaladhi-taranga.
Tava shubha name jage, Tava shubha asisa mage,
Gahe tava jaya gatha,
Jana-gana-mangala-dayaka jaya he Bharata-bhagya-vidhata.
Jaya he, jaya he, jaya he, Jaya jaya jaya, jaya he!

The following is Tagore's English rendering of the anthem: Thou art the ruler of the minds of all people, dispenser of India's destiny. Thy name rouses the hearts of Punjab, Sind, Gujarat and Maratha, of the Dravida and Orissa and Bengal; It echoes in the hills of the Vindyas and Himalayas, mingles in the music of Jamuna and Ganges and is chanted by the waves of the Indian Sea. They pray for thy blessings and sing thy praise. The saving of all people waits in thy hand, thou dispenser of India's destiny. Victory, victory, victory to thee.

NATIONAL SONG

The song Vande Mataram, composed in Sanskrit by Bankimchandra Chatterji, was a source of inspiration to the people in their struggle for freedom. It has an equal status with Jana-gana-mana. The first political occasion when it was sung was the 1896 session of the Indian National Congress. The following is the text of its first stanza:

Vande Mataram!
Sujalam, suphalam, malayaja shitalam,
Shasyashyamalam, Mataram!
Vande Mataram!
Shubhrajyotsna pulakitayaminim,
Phullakusumita drumadala shobhinim,
Suhasinim sumadhura bhashinim,
Sukhadam varadam, Mataram!
Vande Mataram, Vande Mataram!

The English translation of the stanza rendered by Sri Aurobindo in prose 1 is:

I bow to thee, Mother, richly-watered, richly-fruited, cool with the winds of the south, dark with the crops of the harvests, The Mother!
Her nights rejoicing in the glory of the moonlight, her lands clothed beautifully with her trees in flowering bloom, sweet of laughter, sweet of speech, The Mother, giver of boons, giver of bliss.

PREAMBLE

These are the opening words of the preamble of the Indian Constitution

66 WE, THE PEOPLE OF INDIA, having solemnly resolved to constitute India into a **SOVEREIGN, SOCIALIST, SECULAR, DEMOCRATIC,**

REPUBLIC and to secure all its citizens:

JUSTICE, social, economic and political;

LIBERTY of thought, expression, belief, faith and worship;

EQUALITY of status and of opportunity; and to promote among them all **FRATERNITY** assuring the dignity of the individual and the unity and integrity of the Nation;

IN OUR CONSTITUENT ASSEMBLY this twenty-sixth day of November, 1949, do HEREBY ADOPT, ENACT AND GIVE TO OURSELVES THIS CONSTITUTION. 99

 we offer Cambridge EY which is designed for ages 3-6. It provides a secure base of
 foundational development and learning, and successful transition to any Class 1 context.
- At HVB we have always nurtured a 360° approach to assessments and we routinely update our parents about the progress of their wards while offering focussed intervention and support wherever required.

INFRASTRUCTURE AT HVB

HVB premises create a positive learning environment for students. Our Library and our learning resources adequately support delivery of the curriculum. Our classrooms are well lit with temperature control and promethean boards. Specialist facilities are provided (e.g. for art and craft, music, language labs, ICT, physical education, robotics and the sciences). We have collaborated with Shiamak Dance Academy, Furtados School of Music, NASCA STEAM (integration of Science, Technology, Engineering, Arts and Mathematics), Gojukai Karate-Do and with numerous sports coaches for excellence in co-curricular activities. Our science and robotics labs are compliant with international standards of excellence and safety. Our library has the most updated editions of books, magazines and periodicals for higher order research and to nurture a love for reading. Secure storage arrangements for question papers and other examination materials comply with Cambridge regulations. At HVB all appropriate facilities are available that comply with Cambridge regulations for accommodating examinations.

LEGAL REQUIREMENTS

HVB is an authorized Cambridge school. Government approval to operate, including any approvals needed to provide the Cambridge curricula are secured. Health and safety policies in line with government requirements are fully in place including the undertaken fire drills and fire compliance measures. First aid provision in line with government requirements are in place including the presence of a full-time nurse and medical room Child protection policies in line with government requirements are fulfilled. The HVB Global academy has counselling services available to students across the Cambridge Pathway. - The counsellor helps in early identification of problem behaviours and takes suitable steps to prevent the onset of psychosocial problems.
 - In case of psychosocial problems detected after their onset, the counsellor works towards finding suitable solutions.

Working with Parents

 To enable holistic support and to ensure that the child's home environment is secure and nurturing, as well as to keep the parents in the loop about the work done in counselling, and how to ensure that the results are maintained at home.

Working with Teachers

 Teacher meetings are extremely crucial to keep the teacher in the loop about the work being done.

How does a school counselor provide services?

Individual counseling

The counselor works with students on an individual basis to help meet the needs of a child.

• Small group counseling

The counselor offers a wide range of small groups focusing on many topics. Topics are decided by needs of students and vary based on need. Some examples of groups may include Cyber-Safety, Self-esteem, Organization, Study Skills, Social Skills and friendship building.

Remedial teaching

The objective of remedial teaching is to give additional help to pupils who, for one reason or another, have fallen behind the rest of the class.

- Remedial programs are used to address gaps in basic skills.
- Most remedial programs target reading and math weaknesses.
- Remedial programs are different from special education services.

Remedial programs are designed to close the gap between what a student knows and what he is expected to know. It targets reading or math skills.

INNOVATION HUB AND LIBRARY - ANVILS OF RESEARCH AND INNOVATION







GRADING AND REPORTING AT HVB

GRADE DESCRIPTORS and PROCEDURES

<u>Internal Summative Assessment</u> This reflects the progress attained by the student in all assessments taken in a subject over the semester. This holds a weighting of 20% towards the overall semester grade.

<u>Semester Examination</u> This reflects the mastery of the content and skills aligned with the Cambridge International requirements and taught throughout the semester. This holds a weighting of 80% towards the overall semester grade.

<u>Academic Achievement</u> A cumulative of Internal Summative Assessment and Examination scores indicates the Academic Achievement for the student.

Effort Grade This evaluates a student's work ethics and habits in the classroom alongside each student's record of academic standing. The Effort Grade is imperative to assessing the whole child and invaluable to celebrating a wide array of learners.

<u>Achievement Descriptors</u> These are subject-specific. Students are encouraged to develop their own approaches to work and may address the achievement descriptors either singularly or in combination as appropriate for their grade and level.

IGCSE Results are reported on an 8-point scale of grades at school $A^*(a^*)$, A(a), B(b), C(c), D(d), E(e), G(g). Grade $A^*(a^*)$ being the highest and grade G(g) the lowest. UNGRADED indicates a standard below that required for grade G(g).

Only subjects in which grades $A^*(a^*)$ to G(g) are attained are recorded on certificates.

<u>A Level Result</u> is reported on an 5-point scale of grades at school $A^*(a^*)$, A(a), B(b), C(c), D(d), or E(e), of which Grade $A^*(a^*)$ is the highest and Grade E(e) the lowest.

Advanced Subsidiary Level Result is indicated by one of the grades at school a(a), b(b), c(c), d(d) or e(e), of which Grade a(a) is the highest and Grade e(e) the lowest.

'UNGRADED' in Advanced Subsidiary Level or Advanced Level subject indicates a standard below that is required for a grade E (e).

Only subjects in which grades A* to E are attained are recorded on certificates.

<u>Cambridge Primary and Lower Secondary (Classes 6 and 7)</u> follow continuous assessment and active learning strategies throughout the academic year.

The HVB GLOBAL ACADEMY, Cambridge Calendar begins in March and ends in February.

The academic school year is divided into two semesters. Semester 1 Exams are in August. Semester 2 Exams are in February.

There are many reasons to study at undergraduate level in India. With a rich history and diversity and a surging global business landscape, the world's most populous democracy is also home to the world's second-largest higher education system, with over 800 universities, 40000 colleges and 11000 stand-alone institutions (*All India Survey on Higher Education (AISHE) Report 2016-17).

GRADES OR MARKS?

Most students who take Cambridge examinations receive a percentage uniform mark (PUM) alongside grades for each subject on their statement of results. The percentage uniform marks correspond to grades and are always calculated out of 100. The percentage uniform mark should be used in India for admission purposes, wherever a numerical score is required. Percentage uniform marks achieved in Cambridge International are treated on a par with marks of Indian Senior Secondary Examinations. For their eligibility criteria, all institutions use aggregate percentage marks achieved in the qualifying exams.

It is important to note that entry to universities is competitive and that they have limited numbers of seats available. You should plan to apply to a wide range of universities to maximise your chances of acceptance.

SCHOOL BUS FACILITY

Every student at HVB, from Nursery up to grade 12 will commute to and fro by school bus only. It is mandatory. Bus fees must be paid as per the schedule given and via DD/CHEQUE only. Along with the fees you must submit the form with all key details clearly filled and specified for each of your wards.

THE LIBRARY

Parents and children can view the availability of books through our website and the school's well-stocked and well-furnished Library. It provides ample reading facilities to develop the study habits of the pupils. Attention is paid to develop speed and comprehension in reading.

Rules:

- 1. Do not raise your voice to a level that causes disturbance to others.
- 2. One to two books shall be issued at a time to pupils for home reading.
- 3. Readers shall not write upon, damage, tear, turn down the leaves of, or make any mark upon any book, manuscript or map belonging to the Library.
- 4. Every person taking a book out of the Library and every reader inside the Library shall be responsible for the safe custody of the book and its return and in the event of it being lost or damaged (including pencil or ink marks), shall either replace the book or pay such compensation as may be fixed by the Librarian with the consent and approval of the Principal.
- 5. Encyclopedia, meant exclusively for use in the Library, shall not be issued for home reading.
 - No book forming a part of the reference collection nor a periodical shall ordinarily be issued out, unless the consent of the Principal has been obtained for overnight reading.
- 6. All books must be returned to the Library for stock-taking before the Annual Examination.
- 7. No hand-bags or bags are allowed in the Library.

THE HOUSE SYSTEM

To foster in the students a sense of collective responsibility and solidarity, a feeling of sociability and unity, the school has the House System. The students are divided into the Alpha, Beta, Gamma and Delta. Each of these Houses has its office-bearers.

There is also a Prefects' Body that helps to maintain House and class discipline. The President, Vice-President and Head Prefect, under the guidance of the Principal, are in charge of this Council, planning, galvanising and organising its moves.

THE SCHOOL BAND

HVB school band is for the benefit of those pupils who are interested in music.

The school band plays at the assemblies, the Annual Athletic Meet, the Annual Prize Distribution function and the school socials.

ELOCUTION

In order to develop oratory abilities, opportunities are provided for exposures through the Annual Elocution Competitions and other platforms at school.

VISITS AND EXCURSIONS

Regular visits are arranged to places of educational interest like the museum, the aquarium, the planetarium, the zoo, the mint, the milk colony, the theatre and the cinema, factories and services visit for our pupils. These visits are a part of the school's education plan and operation.

Excursions within the country and outside it are a usual feature at HVB. They range from a day to weeks. With these excursions, both local and foreign, the school tries to widen the students' horizon of experience learning. HVB hosts the Indo-Denmark exchange programme at school which is an enriching experience for our students.

HVB CO-CURRICULAR

HVB is committed to offering students wide-ranging opportunities for extracurricular participation. The School believes that participation in extracurricular activities enables students to develop talents that may find little expression in the classroom. Club activities expand interactions among students, who are likely to interact with others who are different from them.

COUNSELLING SERVICE

The School offers emotional and career counselling to students and parents. The basic objective of counselling is the overall development of students. It is aimed at helping each individual to gain an insight into the dynamics of his/her behaviour, to prepare alternate action plan for improving on his performance and to achieve his/her set targets and goals.

THE ARTS

To enable the pupils to express their innermost feelings the curriculum includes Art, Drawing, Painting, Art Appreciation, Craft, Music and Dance.

The principles of charity and humanitarianism are fostered in the child from an early age. Annual camps are compulsory.

GENERAL RULES

Admissions and Withdrawals

- Children who complete 2,3,4 & 5 years before the 1st of January of the previous academic year of which they are seeking admission, shall be admitted to the Playgroup, Nursery and K.G. Lower classes, respectively.
- 2. Pupils seeking admission to the K.G. Higher upwards shall be subjected to an interview, provided they meet the age requirements.
- 3. Pupils who join the school have to produce two Municipal Birth Certificates in support of the date of birth entered in the admission form. The admission of pupils from unrecognised schools shall not be entertained as per school rules.

- 4. Candidates who have attended any recognised school shall not be admitted without a Leaving Certificate from the school last attended. If they come from a school outside the State of Maharashtra, the Leaving Certificate has to be countersigned by the inspector of the division in which the school is situated. Candidate must also submit the most recent Statement of Results or Marksheet of previous exam given.
- 5. Admission fees once paid are not refundable.
- 6. Pupils once admitted cannot be withdrawn without a month's notice. Those who leave the school in April must pay their fees for May also.
- 7. Leaving Certificates shall not be issued unless all school dues are paid and all books and articles belonging to the school are returned.
- 8. The Principal reserves the right to suspend or dismiss any pupil if his/her behaviour or progress is unsatisfactory.

Recommendations to Parents

- 1. Parents are requested to co-operate with the school by working side by side with it towards the growth and development of the child.
- 2. Regular hours of study at home help children develop proper study habits.
- 3. The school shall be sending, at regular intervals, messages, notices, reports of midterm tests and exams, performance status, personality traits etc., through the pupils. Parents are requested to look into these and return them promptly, duly signed.
- 4. Private tuitions shall not be encouraged. Private tutors may not be engaged except when the sanction of the Principal is obtained. Special arrangements shall be made to coach a academically weak children and the parents of such pupils shall be expected to share the expenses. The school staff, does not take private tuitions.
- Parents are required to seek permission from the Principal before seeing pupils or meeting their teachers during school hours. Parents can meet the staff after school hours or by prior appointment, for which they shall carry with them the interviewing teacher's appointment slip.
- 6. Parents are requested to refrain from seeing the teachers one week before the commencement of the examinations and till the results are declared.
- 7. Parents are expected to be very particular to see that their children return home immediately after school hours, except on days when they stay on for co-curricular activities. It may be noted that the responsibility of the school authorities ceases immediately after school hours.

8. Any change in the residential address or telephone / mobile number may please be immediately notified to the school authorities.

Rules of Discipline

- 1. On school days and at school functions, the students should wear a clean starched and ironed school uniform as prescribed by school.
 - On all Physical Education days, all the pupils boys and girls-shall wear black Reebok shoes and the complete sports outfit.
 - It is compulsory for every student to wear the school cap and gloves as and when required for inter-school competitions or participation.
 - Students are requested to wear only school sweaters as per school rules. No fancy Jackets or multi coloured sweaters will be permitted. All students must purchase their house coloured PE Uniform for all sporting activities.
- 2. Pupils are not allowed to wear any ornaments or bring any valuable articles to the school. These shall be confiscated.
- 3. Personal hygiene and cleanliness is laid stress on. Nails and hair should be properly and regularly trimmed as per the directions of the school authorities.
- 4. The school is very particular about its pupils' personal cleanliness and uniform. It reserves the right to check pupils violating the above rules, to confiscate items that do not conform to the set pattern, to take such measures as it thinks fit to enforce the above rules and requirements and to bring the dress and uniform in conformity therewith.
- 5. No pupil who has been absent from the school or is late for the first period shall be admitted to the class, without the Principal's permission.
- Pupils are responsible to the school authorities for their conduct both in and outside
 the school. Misbehaviour and/or use of foul language in the school and outside or on
 roads and in public conveyances is a just cause for the school to take regulatory
 action.
- Irregular attendance, missing classes and extra classes, unjustified or unexplained absence, habitual idleness, disobedience or objectionable moral influence justify dismissal.
- 8. Any change made in the entries made by staff-members in report-cards and other school records will be dealt with seriously and may amount to even rustication.
- 9. Running, playing and/or shouting inside the school building is not allowed.
- 10. When the pupils move along the corridors and when they are on the staircases, they are expected to walk in silence and in single file, keeping to the left.

- 11. Any kind of damage done in school premises will have to be made good by the pupil concerned.
- 12. Students must not throw pieces of paper, pencil shavings and other waste in the class or in the corridors. All such material must be deposited in wastebins provided for the purpose.
- 13. All must converse in English at school except during second Language classes.
- 14. Children must carry their own dry lunch/tiffin boxes to school. No dabbawala or servants bringing lunch boxes are permitted during lunch breaks.
- 15. The School gives additional academic opportunity support for those students who need it. Once the parents are committed to this arrangement, they have to stand by them till specified duration.
- 16. Every pupil should endeavour to keep up the high ranking and good name the school, by excelling in fine manners and conduct.
- 17. When allowed by Principal only miniscule display of Mehendi should be on palm as token of cultural requirement.

Absence and Leave

- 1. No leave of absence is granted except on previous written application from parents and then too only for serious reasons.
- 2. Absence without leave is liable to punishment.
- 3. The Principal must be informed at once if the pupil is to be absent from school through illness. Wherever a child is absent, even if it is for a day, the entry should be made in the calendar, failing which the child will be sent home. In case the child is sick, the calendar entry is to be supported with a medical certificate. Intimation to the school should be immediate.
- 4. Children suffering from an infectious disease shall not be allowed to attend school. A doctor's certificate that the pupil is free from infection should be sent with him when he begins to attend the school, after such illness. Chickenpox, measles, jaundice, mumps, herpes, etc, require a three week stay at home, since that is the medically prescribed incubation period for these illnesses.
- 5. No leave shall be granted for out of Mumbai weddings, religious festivals, mundan ceremonies, on school working days. If any of these functions is personal and important that the pupil has to be there, then such ceremonies are expected to be fixed up during the school holidays.

- In case of absence without leave, the child, on returning to the school, must have the
 reason of absence entered and signed by his parent on the leave record. Absence
 immediately prior to examinations and tests necessiates punishment.
- Absence on the reopening day of the school after the vacations or on the last working day during the school terms renders the pupil's name liable to being struck off the rolls
- 8. AS and AL students need to abide by 100% attendance requirement and all rules as stated above.

Fee Rules

- 1. All fees are to be paid in advance, half yearly or annually using HVB Edusprint Portal.
- 2. If fees are not paid and the pupil has not been excused by special arrangement, he is liable to be sent home.
- 3. Delay in payment beyond a month without giving any appropriate reason renders the name of the pupil liable to being struck off the rolls.
- 4. No deductions shall be made for vacations or for broken periods.
- 5. Fees Once Paid Are Non-Refundable.
- 6. Parents must pay on / before due date.

- 8. Parents can pay school fees directly through the School Edusprint App with various options available.
- 9. Please note that school will accept fees only via MICM and not entertain any other mode of payment.

Late Fee

The late fees charges will be levied if fee is not paid in time

The parents are requested to pay their fees on or before the due date. If there is any genuine problem it should be intimated to the Principal in writing or else from the next day onward child will not be allowed to enter the school.

Examination and Promotions

- 1. Any pupil found using unfair means shall be debarred from appearing for the rest of the examination and, consequently, shall be detained in his class and rusticated from the school.
- 2. Application for the verification of marks in special cases will be considered at the discretion of the Principal.
- 3. Promotion of pupils will depend not only on the final report but also on the results of Internal Assessments the mid-term tests, projects and the progress made throughout the year.
- 4. If, for a valid and accepted reason, a pupil is not able to appear for a whole or part of an examination, his case will be considered on the strength of the year's record.
- 5. A pupil who fails to be promoted twice will have to discontinue his studies at the school.
- 6. Promotion, once refused, shall under no circumstances be reconsidered.

Regular attendance, good conduct and persevering application are indispensable conditions for any award or prize.

Prizes are awarded for general proficiency and for proficiency in each and every academic and non-academic subject, the school having a very elaborate and comprehensive scheme.

The pediatrician can telephonically guide to the right doctors and in case of an emergency, they can guide the parent with information about nearest hospital, pharmacy or laboratory. **This 24 Hours exclusive service is available throughout this academic year for the students of HVB**.

HVB students will avail routine medical checks at school for:
