



# Happiness Quotient (HQ)

Research on people's well-being and overall happiness has shown the following six factors to be crucial in determining the sense of happiness an individual has with their life. These factors include: Sense of meaning and purpose, Relationship and Social Support, Freedom (of choice), Health, and Generosity. We collect data on each of these factors, and then quantify and process the data to calculate learner's Happiness Quotient (HQ). HQ is and estimation of degree of learner's well-being and happiness at present. The figure below shows how the learner has fared across the five factors mentioned above. Each of the factors is scored in the range 0 to 10, represents immediate need for action to improve and 10 represents an optimum level of well-being happiness. HQ is calculated based on these scores.

The shaded area in the above figure represents learner's existing level of well-being and happiness, whereas, the unshaded area represents the scope for improving learner's well-being and happiness by making appropriate changes in habits, lifestyle, behaviour, attitude, support from relationships and environment. The following achievement description provide interpretation of learner's HQ score.

#### **Achievement descriptors**


1≤ HQ < 4	Generally happy with a wide range of positive and happy sentiments, and a positive sense of self in relation to the people around them.
4 ≤ HQ < 8	Enhanced happiness and well-being marked by generally positive attitude, a healthy sense of self, willingness to help others, cheerfulness and joy that percolates in most aspects of life including personal and social.
8 ≤ HQ ≤ 10	High level of happiness and well-being marked by high self-esteem, a positive approach to challenges, a strong willingness to help others, and meaning interpersonal relationships with peers and other majority of people in the surroundings


#### **HVB's Happiness Ambassadors**

Every year we selected and felicitate one learner from each section as HVB's Happiness Ambassador. He selection and based on the assessment of the required evidence turned in by each learner on a predefine set of parameters and on the learner's overall conducts in and out of the classroom at school.

Evaluation of evidence submitted by learners will depend on the **authenticity** of the work. Learners must make sure that everything they include in the evidence must be their own work and reflects their own views, not somebody else's.

**IMPORTANT**: Submission of these evidences is mandatory. HQ will be included in the report card. Report card will not be issued if learners have not submitted evidence for calculation of HQ.





## **NATIONAL ANTHEM**

The song, Jana-gana-mana, composed originally in Bengali by Rabindranath Tagore, was adopted in its Hindi version by the Constituent Assembly as the National Anthem of India on January 24, 1950. It was first sung on December 27, 1911 at the Calcutta session of the Indian National Congress. The complete song consists of five stanzas.

Jana-gana-mana-adhinayaka, jaya he,
Bharata-bhagya-vidhata.
Punjab-Sindh-Gujarat-Maratha,
Dravida-Utkala-Banga,
Vindhya-Himachala-Yamuna-Ganga
Uchchala-Jaladhi-taranga.
Tava shubha name jage, Tava shubha asisa mage,
Gahe tava jaya gatha,
Jana-gana-mangala-dayaka jaya he Bharata-bhagya-vidhata.
Jaya he, jaya he, jaya he, Jaya jaya, jaya he!

The following is Tagore's English rendering of the anthem: Thou art the ruler of the minds of all people, dispenser of India's destiny. Thy name rouses the hearts of Punjab, Sind, Gujarat and Maratha, of the Dravida and Orissa and Bengal; It echoes in the hills of the Vindyas and Himalayas, mingles in the music of Jamuna and Ganges and is chanted by the waves of the Indian Sea. They pray for thy blessings and sing thy praise. The saving of all people waits in thy hand, thou dispenser of India's destiny. Victory, victory, victory to thee.

## **NATIONAL SONG**

The song Vande Mataram, composed in Sanskrit by Bankimchandra Chatterji, was a source of inspiration to the people in their struggle for freedom. It has an equal status with Jana-gana-mana. The first political occasion when it was sung was the 1896 session of the Indian National Congress. The following is the text of its first stanza:

Vande Mataram!
Sujalam, suphalam, malayaja shitalam,
Shasyashyamalam, Mataram!
Vande Mataram!
Shubhrajyotsna pulakitayaminim,
Phullakusumita drumadala shobhinim,
Suhasinim sumadhura bhashinim,
Sukhadam varadam, Mataram!
Vande Mataram, Vande Mataram!

The English translation of the stanza rendered by Sri Aurobindo in prose 1 is:

I bow to thee, Mother, richly-watered, richly-fruited, cool with the winds of the south, dark with the crops of the harvests, The Mother!
Her nights rejoicing in the glory of the moonlight, her lands clothed beautifully with her trees in flowering bloom, sweet of laughter, sweet of speech, The Mother, giver of boons, giver of bliss.

# **PREAMBLE**

These are the opening words of the preamble of the Indian Constitution

**66 WE, THE PEOPLE OF INDIA**, having solemnly resolved to constitute India into a **SOVEREIGN, SOCIALIST, SECULAR, DEMOCRATIC**,



## The Role Of Counsellor at HVB

School counsellors work collaboratively with Head of School and teachers to decide on what action needs to be taken to address issues interfering with a learner's learning process. ### Working with Parents

 To enable holistic support and to ensure that the child's home environment is secure and nurturing, as well as to keep the parents in the loop about the work done in counselling, and how to ensure that the results are maintained at home.

## • Working with Teachers

 Teacher meetings are extremely crucial to keep the teacher in the loop about the work being done.

## How does a school counselor provide services?

#### Individual counseling

The counselor works with learners on an individual basis to help meet the needs of a child.

#### Small group counseling

The counselor offers a wide range of small groups focusing on many topics. Topics are decided by needs of learners and vary based on need. Some examples of groups may include Cyber-Safety, Self-esteem, Organization, Study Skills, Social Skills and friendship building.

#### Remedial teaching

The objective of remedial teaching is to give additional help to learners who, for one reason or another, have fallen behind the rest of the class.

- Remedial programs are used to address gaps in basic skills.
- Most remedial programs target reading and math weaknesses.
- Remedial programs are different from special education services.

Remedial programs are designed to close the gap between what a Learners knows and what he is expected to know. It targets reading or math skills.

## RESEARCH CENTRE AND LIBRARY - ANVILS OF RESEARCH AND INNOVATION




#### CORE AND ADVANCED SKILLS ENRICHMENT PROGRAMMES - STEM







#### **GRADING AND REPORTING AT HVB**

#### **GRADE DESCRIPTORS and PROCEDURES**

<u>Internal Summative Assessment</u> This reflects the progress attained by the learner in all assessments taken in a subject over the semester. This holds a weighting of 20% towards the overall semester grade.

<u>Semester Examination</u> This reflects the mastery of the content and skills aligned with the Cambridge International requirements and taught throughout the semester. This holds a weighting of 80% towards the overall semester grade. This exam is taken twice a year; once mid-year and once at the year-end. This examination is only for Grades 8 to 12.

<u>Academic Achievement</u> A cumulative of Internal Summative Assessment and Examination scores indicates the Academic Achievement for the learner.

**Effort Grade** This evaluates a learner's work ethics and habits in the classroom alongside each learner's record of academic standing. The Effort Grade is imperative to assessing the whole child and invaluable to celebrating a wide array of learners.

<u>Achievement Descriptors</u> These are subject-specific. Learners are encouraged to develop their own approaches to work and may address the achievement descriptors either singularly or in combination as appropriate for their grade and level.

**IGCSE Results** are reported on an 8-point scale of grades at school  $A^*(a^*)$ , A(a), B(b), C(c), D(d), E(e), G(g). Grade  $A^*(a^*)$  being the highest and grade G(g) the lowest. UNGRADED indicates a standard below that required for grade G(g).

Only subjects in which grades  $A^*(a^*)$  to G(g) are attained are recorded on certificates.

#### **SCHOOL TRANSPORT FACILITY 2024-2025**

The need for safe passage of each child to school and back home is of paramount importance to us. To ensure safe travel the school will provide its own bus service of school buses designed as per standards and manned by trained drivers and personnel sensitized to the need of small children. For supervision and monitoring a transport attendant is on board throughout the journey. Mobile phones have been provided in each bus that ensures efficiency in term of service and better communication in case of emergencies. Besides ensuring the implementation of the safety norms, all staff on the bus is well trained in first aid and emergency management.

- 1 The school bus facility is mandatory for students to avoid any traffic issues. NO PRIVATE VANS/TAXIS/PERSONAL TWO WHEELERS FOR CARS are allowed on F-ROAD.
- 2 The school bus facility is only exempted for only those students who meet the below specified conditions and have already sought prior approval from school for the same. Under such circumstances the School authorities shall not be hold responsible for any learner's safety after s/he steps out of HVB school premises unattended.
  - reside within 600 metres radius of school
  - have an approved and certified medical reason \*Medical Certified is must
  - commute using public transport facilities namely train / BEST / bus \*Travel Pass must be attached
- 3 Parents are required to make the bus fees payment in advance on yearly basis to the bus vendor itself along with the School Fees. The payment should be made online to Shanta Durga Travels through the chakraview app.
- 4 Learners availing the bus facility will be provided an access to the School bus mobile app "Chakraview" which will guide you through the bus number, pick up and drop nodel points, bus route tracking, sms when the bus is about to reach the nodel stop. Generally, the bus timings will operate within 10 to 15 minutes of the pickup and alighting time. Parents are requested to accommodate the same.

- 5 Any change in the bus timings will be notified to the parent.
- 6 Learners will have to board and alight the school bus at the respective stops allotted to them only.
- 7 Learners are required to compulsory wear a seat belt. Any learner found moving or standing in the bus, disciplinary action will be taken against that child.
- 8 Learners while travelling on the school bus must maintain discipline. Any student guilty of misconduct will not be allowed to avail the bus facility.
- 9 A Learner shall be refused the bus facility if involved in damage to the bus property. Besides, the damage done will have to be compensated by the student.
- 10 Learners / parents will not have any transaction / altercation / physical fight with the bus staff. Bus staff are not authorized to change / add bus stops.
- 11 School has taken utmost care for the safety and convenience of the students. Any suggestion / complaint regarding the transport service is to be made in writing strictly either to the Transport Committee elected by the PTA or else to the principal@hvbglobalacademy.org.
- 12 School Bus team is strictly instructed to bring back to school any student who is not picked up by the authorised person at the exact designated drop off point. No child will be handed over to any unknown person.
- 13 Is is mandatory that the authorised person shows the Parent ID Card / Authorisation Letter at the drop off point.
- 14 Please cooperate with the drivers and attendants. It takes nearly two weeks to set the transport route. Hence, there is a possibility of mismatch of timings given to you at the start.

#### THE LIBRARY

Parents and children can view the availability of books through our website and the school's well-stocked and well-furnished Library. It provides ample reading facilities to develop the study habits of the learners.

#### Rules:

- 1. Do not raise your voice to a level that causes disturbance to others.
- 2. One to two books shall be issued at a time to learners for home reading.
- 3. Readers shall not write upon, damage, tear, turn down the leaves of, or make any mark upon any book, manuscript or map belonging to the Library.
- 4. Every person taking a book out of the Library and every reader inside the Library shall be responsible for the safe custody of the book and its return and in the event of it

being lost or damaged (including pencil or ink marks), shall either replace the book or pay such compensation as may be fixed by the Librarian with the consent and approval of the Principal.

- 5. Encyclopedia, meant exclusively for use in the Library, shall not be issued for home reading.
  - No book forming a part of the reference collection nor a periodical shall ordinarily be issued out, unless the consent of the Principal has been obtained for overnight reading.
- 6. All books must be returned to the Library for stock-taking before the Annual Examination.
- 7. No hand-bags or bags are allowed in the Library.

#### THE HOUSE SYSTEM

To foster in the learners a sense of collective responsibility and solidarity, a feeling of sociability and unity, the school has the House System. The learners are divided into the Alpha, Beta, Gamma and Delta. Each of these Houses has its office-bearers.

There is also a Prefects' Body that helps to maintain House and class discipline. The President, Vice-President and Head Prefect, under the guidance of the Principal, are in charge of this Council, planning, galvanising and organising its moves.

#### THE SCHOOL BAND

HVB school band is for the benefit of those learners who are interested in music.

The school band plays at the assemblies, the Annual Athletic Meet, the Annual Prize Distribution function and the school socials.

#### **ELOCUTION**

In order to develop oratory abilities, opportunities are provided for exposures through the Annual Elocution Competitions and other platforms at school.

#### **VISITS AND EXCURSIONS**

Regular visits are arranged to places of educational interest like the museum, the aquarium, the planetarium, the zoo, the mint, the milk colony, the theatre and the cinema, factories and services for our learners. These visits are a part of the school's education plan and operation.

Excursions within the country and outside it are a usual feature at HVB. They range from a day to weeks. With these excursions, both local and foreign, the school tries to widen the learner's horizon of experience learning. HVB hosts the Indo-Denmark exchange programme at school which is an enriching experience for our learners.

#### **HVB CO-CURRICULAR**

HVB is committed to offering learners wide-ranging opportunities for extracurricular participation. The School believes that participation in extracurricular activities enables learners to develop talents that may find little expression in the classroom. Club activities expand interactions among learners, who are likely to interact with others who are different from them.

#### **COUNSELLING SERVICE**

The School offers emotional and career counselling to learners and parents. The basic objective of counselling is the overall development of learners. It is aimed at helping each individual to gain an insight into the dynamics of his/her behaviour, to prepare alternate action plan for improving on his performance and to achieve his/her set targets and goals.

#### THE ARTS

To enable the learners to express their innermost feelings the curriculum includes Art, Drawing, Painting, Art Appreciation, Craft, Music and Dance.

Our learners receive several inter-school and international prizes.

#### PHYSICAL EDUCATION

With a view in keeping the child healthy and fit, special attention is paid to sports, physical culture and games - indoor and outdoor - including cricket, badminton, table tennis, throw-ball, foot-ball, weight-lifting, gymnastic, skating & swimming, etc. Physical Education & Martial Art is encouraged.

#### **COMMUNITY SERVICE**

The principles of charity and humanitarianism are fostered in the child from an early age. The learners provide service to national and social organisations like Ujjwal Bhavishya, Behtar India, Desh Apnaye, Help Us Help Them They often voluntary visit to hospitals, the aged, the handicapped, child welfare centres, etc, with gifts and donations. Annual camps are compulsory.

#### **OLYMPIADS**

The learners are sent for external competitive examinations in diverse subject Olympiads like Science, Mathematics, Cyber and many more.

#### **ROAD SAFETY PATROL GROUP**

The Road Safety Patrol is organised to help our learners to learn and obey traffic rules. The RSP group also helps in the smooth flow of vehicles at the entrance of the school at its meeting and dispersal times.

#### **GENERAL RULES**

#### **Admissions**

- 1. Children who complete 2,3,4 & 5 years on or before 31st December of the previous academic year of which they are seeking admission, shall be admitted to the Playgroup, EY1, EY2 and EY3 classes, respectively.
- 2. Learners seeking admission to EY 3 upwards shall be subject to an interaction, provided they meet the age requirements.
- Learners who join the school have to produce Municipal Birth Certificate and Aadhar Card in support of the date of birth entered in the admission form. The admission of learners from unrecognised schools shall not be entertained as per school rules.
- 4. Admissions are strictly as per the age criteria prescribed.
- 5. Candidates who have attended any recognised school shall not be admitted without a Leaving Certificate from the school last attended. If they come from a school outside the State of Maharashtra, the Leaving Certificate has to be countersigned by the inspector of the division in which the school is situated. Candidate must also submit the most recent Statement of Results or Marksheet of previous exam given.
- 6. Admission and processing fees once paid are not refundable.

#### **Withdrawals**

- Parent or guardian wishing to withdraw their child or ward from school must notify their intention to the Principal.
- One calendar month's notice and fees will have to be given for the withdrawal of the child from the school. Those who leave the School in April must pay their fees for May also
- All dues must be cleared and books and other school property items returned, before the child is withdrawn and transfer certificate is obtained.
- Management may require the withdrawal of any learner, when satisfied, that such a step is necessary in the interest of the school and best interest of the child.

#### **Recommendations to Parents**

1. Parents are requested to co-operate with the school by working side by side with it towards the growth and development of the child.

- 2. Regular hours of study at home help children develop proper study habits.
- 3. The school shall be sending at regular intervals, reports of mid-term tests and exams, performance status, personality traits etc., via School app Edusprint+, emails etc.
- 4. Private tuitions shall not be encouraged. Private tutors may not be engaged except when the sanction of the Principal is obtained. Special arrangements shall be made to coach a academically weak children and the parents of such learners shall be expected to share the expenses. The school staff, does not take private tuitions.
- 5. Parents are required to seek permission from the Principal before seeing their ward or meeting teachers during school hours. Parents can meet the staff after school hours or by prior appointment, for which they shall carry with them the appointment slip.
- 6. Parents are requested to refrain from seeing the teachers one week before the commencement of the examinations and till the results are declared.
- 7. Parents are expected to be very particular to see that their children return home immediately after school hours, except on days when they stay on for co-curricular activities. It may be noted that the responsibility of the school authorities ceases immediately after school hours.
- 8. Any change in the residential address or telephone / mobile number may please be immediately notified to the school authorities.

#### 9. Dress code

There are several events and occasions throughout the year when learners may be allowed or required dress in attire other than the regular school uniform and the sports uniform depending on the nature of the event or occasion. Such attires include formal, traditional, casual and semi-casual. All learners are required to observe the following general rules as they dress for the occasion to ensure propriety:

Girls must not wear tops that are low cut and/or expose most of the back. Where skirts are concerned, they should be at least knee-length or longer.

Boys must not wear tank tops regardless of the occasion unless specifically asked to wear one. Fashion jewelry items such as thick chains, bracelets must be always be avoided.

#### **Rules of Discipline & Uniform**

- 1. On school days and at school functions, the learner should wear a clean starched and ironed school uniform as prescribed by school.
  - On all Physical Education days, all the learners boys and girls-shall wear black shoes and the complete sports outfit.
  - It is compulsory for every learner to wear the school cap and gloves as and when required for inter-school competitions or participation.
  - Learner are requested to wear only school sweaters as per school rules. No fancy jackets or multi coloured sweaters will be permitted. All Learners must purchase their house coloured PE Uniform for all sporting activities.
- Learners are not allowed to wear any ornaments or bring any valuable articles to the school. These shall be confiscated.
- 3. Personal hygiene and cleanliness is laid stress on. Nails and hair should be properly and regularly trimmed as per the directions of the school authorities.
- 4. The school is very particular about its learners' personal cleanliness and uniform. It reserves the right to check learners violating the above rules, to confiscate items that do not conform to the set pattern, to take such measures as it thinks fit to enforce the above rules and requirements and to bring the dress and uniform in conformity therewith.
- 5. No learner who has been absent from the school or is late for the first period shall be admitted to the class, without the Principal's permission.
- 6. Learners are responsible to the school authorities for their conduct both in and outside the school. Misbehaviour and/or use of foul language in the school and outside or on roads and in public conveyances is a just cause for the school to take regulatory action.
- Irregular attendance, missing classes and extra classes, unjustified or unexplaine 160
  absence, habitual idleness, disobedience or objectionable moral influence justify
  dismissal.
- 8. Any change made in the entries made by staff-members in report-cards and other school records will be dealt with seriously and may amount to even rustication.
- 9. Running, playing and/or shouting inside the school building is not allowed.
- 10. When the learners move along the corridors and when they are on the staircases, they are expected to walk in silence and in single file, keeping to the left.

- 11. Any kind of damage done in school premises will have to be made good by the concerned parent.
- 12. Learners must not throw pieces of paper, pencil shavings and other waste in the class or in the corridors. All such material must be deposited in wastebins provided for the purpose.
- 13. All must converse in English at school except during Second Language classes.
- 14. Children must carry their own dry lunch/tiffin boxes to school. No dabbawala or servants bringing lunch boxes are permitted during lunch breaks.
- 15. The School gives additional academic opportunity support for those learners who need it. Once the parents are committed to this arrangement, they have to stand by it till specified duration.
- 16. Every Learner should endeavour to keep up the high ranking and good name of the school, by excelling in fine manners and conduct.
- 17. When allowed by Principal only miniscule display of Mehendi should be on palm as token of cultural requirement.
- 18. Co-curicular activities till 3.30 pm. no excuse for tuition.
- 19. School will not be responsible for any student or any act of student after school hours and beyond school premises.
- 20. School responsibility ceases once the child leaves the school premises.
- 21. Our school is a smoke free campus. For better health, smoking products are prohibited on our campus. Any act contrary to the school provisions is an illegal & punishable offence.
- 22. We strongly advise parents not to enrol their ward(s) in private tuition / coaching classes, particularly those instructed by untrained teacher who are aware of the philosophy of the Cambridge curriculum and international standards in pedagogy. In our year of experience, we have observed the following changes in learners who all private tuitions / coaching classes from such teachers:
  - Negative changes in academic performance in the classroom due to acquisition
    of incorrect concepts, creating a challenge for our school teachers to valuable
    time and resources in, first, the unlearning of wrong concepts and then
    subsequent relearning of the concepts.
  - 2. Adoption of negative views and attitudes toward learning and education (viewing learning only as a means to gain marks.)
  - 3. Behavioural issues wherein learners adopt abusive language, consumption of vape, etc from their peers from other schools.

#### **Absence and Leave**

- 1. No leave of absence is granted except on previous written application from parents and then too only for serious reasons.
- 2. Absence without leave is liable to punishment.
- 3. The Principal must be informed at once if the learner is to be absent from school through illness. Wherever a child is absent, even if it is for a day, the entry should be made in the calendar, failing which the child will be sent home. In case the child is sick, the calendar entry is to be supported with a medical certificate. Intimation to the school can be immediate via email to the Principal.
- 4. Learner suffering from an infectious disease is not allowed to attend school. A doctor's certificate that the learner is free from infection should be sent when learner begins to attend the school, after such illness. Chickenpox, measles, jaundice, mumps, herpes, etc, require a three week stay at home, since that is the medically prescribed incubation period for these illnesses.
- No leave shall be granted for out of Mumbai weddings, religious festivals, mundan ceremonies, on school working days. If any of these functions require learner's presence, then such ceremonies are expected to be fixed up during the school holidays.
- 6. In case of absence without leave, the learner on returning to the school, must have the reason of absence entered and signed by his parent on the leave record. Absence immediately prior to examinations and tests necessiates punishment.
- Absence on the reopening day of the school after the vacations or on the last working day during the school terms renders the learners name liable to being struck off the rolls.
- 8. AS and AL Learners need to abide by 100% attendance requirement and all rules as stated above.
- 9. Please note that for a learner to be promoted to the next class, he/she must have at least 75% attendance (of the total working days) in each semester of the current academic year. Regular attendance ensures that a learner has adequate access to the support and guidance required to timely and effectively address learning challenges, maintain academic progress, form positive learning experiences, and improve performance. Missing school not only hampers a learner's academic progress but also their motivation. Therefore, it is imperative for learners to maintain regular attendance during the course of the academic session. Though the minimum attendance required is 75%, we strongly advise that learners maintain 100% attendance during regular school days.

#### **Fee Rules**

- 1. All fees are to be paid as per the School schedule using HVB Edusprint+ Portal.
- 2. If fees are not paid and the learner has not been excused by special arrangement, strict disciplinary action will be taken.
- 3. No deductions shall be made for vacations or for broken periods.
- 4. Fees Once Paid Are Non-Refundable.
- 5. Parents must pay fees on / before the due date.

#### **Late Fee**

The late fees charges are levied if fee is not paid in time

The parents are requested to pay their fees on or before the due date. If there is any genuine problem it should be intimated to the Principal in writing, and subject to Principals' further decision.

#### **Examination and Promotions**

- Any learner found using unfair means shall be debarred from appearing for the rest of the examination and, consequently, shall be detained in his class and rusticated from the school.
- 2. Application for the verification of marks in special cases will be considered at the discretion of the Principal.
- 3. Promotion of Learners will depend not only on the final report but also on the results of Internal Assessments the mid-term tests, projects and the progress made throughout the year.
- 4. If, for a valid and accepted reason, a learner is not able to appear for a whole or part of an examination, his case will be considered on the strength of the year's record.
- 5. A learner who fails to be promoted twice will have to discontinue his studies at the school.
- 6. Promotion, once refused, shall under no circumstances be reconsidered.

To ensure our learners' safety and security, the entire school premises and the school buses are equipped with constant audio and video surveillance. In case any person who is not a school staff wishes to enter the school premises for any reason, they pass through multiple security checks starting at the main gate and then at the reception. Additionally, the school undergoes routine electrical, structural and fire safety audits in accordance with norms establish by the government by a certified independent licensed agencies.

The Management regularly organizes, workshop sessions for all stakeholders of the school, specifically students and parents along with active team of teachers centered on key safety concerns such as fire safety management, transport management, cyber safety management, social awareness campaigns, types of parenting, and good touch and bad touch.

Medical observation will be conducted within school premises and under the supervision of a team of eminent and specialized doctors. This is available absolutely free of cost for all HVB Learners and there is no financial cost involved for the same.
